


This Russian cannon was captured at Sebastopol in 1855. It originally stood outside the old town hall, but was moved here in 1883. Some time later a German gun joined it, but both of them along with most of Malton's iron railing were later removed for scrap, to be used in the Second World War.

The Urban Sanitary Authority' was abolished in 1894. Therefore, photo taken between 1883 and 1894




Yorkersgate and The George Horel with its archway. Opposite, the archway to Dodsworth's work shops. Timber came by boat, and was carried up Warer Lane and across to the workshops. The building (left), with railings, is the Corn Exchange.




Yorkersgate. On the right is the Post Office. It moved from Chancery Lane, to Post Office Corner (Butcher Corner) in 1888, and later moved to Wheelgate in 1911. The impressive building on the left is the Savings Bank.



The War Memorial and Cannon. The Cannon was placed here in 1883, and was captured in 1855 at Schastopol during the Crimean War.
