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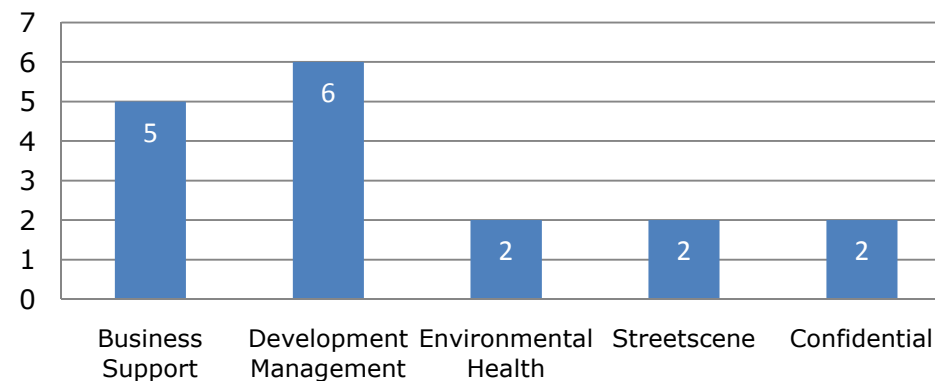


## Complaint Type Description

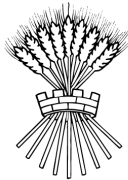

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## **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

### **1.0 PURPOSE OF REPORT**

- 1.1 To inform Members of the progress towards delivery of the 2014/15 Safer Ryedale Action Plan.
- 1.2 To present the Joint Strategic Intelligence Assessment (JSIA) to Members and to seek Member views on the Ryedale additions.
- 1.3 To inform Members of the current Police and Crime Commissioner funding agreement to tackle Anti Social Behaviour in Ryedale.

### **2.0 RECOMMENDATION**

- 2.1 It is recommended that Members note the report and appendices and provide feedback to Officers.

### **3.0 REASON FOR RECOMMENDATION**

- 3.1 The Police and Justice Act 2006 placed a statutory duty on local authorities to put in place arrangements for crime and disorder scrutiny committees, the statutory function of the committee being to review, scrutinise and report on the decisions made and action taken by responsible authorities relating to crime and disorder issues under the Crime and Disorder Act 1998.
- 3.2 The Overview and Scrutiny Committee was designated as the Ryedale District Council's crime and disorder overview and scrutiny committee in July 2009. To undertake this function, it was resolved to receive reports from the Safer Ryedale Partnership. (Minute 42(b) refers.)

### **4.0 SIGNIFICANT RISKS**

## REPORT

### 5.0 BACKGROUND AND INTRODUCTION

- 5.1 The North Yorkshire Community Safety Partnership has now been established. Within this context, the Safer Ryedale Delivery Team meet approximately 4 times per annum to review progress towards delivery of the Safer Ryedale Partnership Plan. A 'family tree' diagram is included in Annex B
- 5.2 The JSIA 2014 is a 'refreshed' version of the 2013 document'. It has been presented to the North Yorkshire Community Safety Partnership.
- 5.3 The document is classified as 'Restricted' and therefore may be circulated freely within law enforcement and also to partners and partnerships where Information Sharing Agreements are in place and registered with the Force Information Manager, Legal and Compliance Directorate. This is not a public document and is exempt from the Freedom of Information Act 2000 under Section 31.
- 5.4 Safer Ryedale's and the Police and Crime Commissioner's (PCC) priorities for 2015/16 will be based on the data published in the JSIA.
- 5.5 The PCC has commissioned Safer Ryedale to deliver a programme to tackle Anti Social Behaviour between September 2014 and March 2015.

### 6.0 POLICY CONTEXT

- 6.1 Council Priorities 2014 – 2018 Aim 4: To have active communities where everyone feels welcome and safe.

### 7.0 CONSULTATION

- 7.1 A variety of approaches are used to engage with communities, both face to face and through consultation exercises. These include:

  - Bi-annual street surveys in all four of Ryedale's market towns
  - Valued network of Watch Groups.

### 8.0 REPORT DETAILS

#### 2014/15 Partnership Plan

- 8.1 The Partnership Plan is published, on line, on the Safer Ryedale website. [www.ryesafe.org](http://www.ryesafe.org). The Performance Monitoring Report for Quarter 3 of 2014/15 is in annex C.

## **Introduction to the JSIA 2014**

- 8.2 The Strategic Service Assessment (JSIA) has been produced by North Yorkshire Police. The resultant document is therefore GPMS 'Restricted' and is an internal document for use by the partnership and constituent member agencies, as well as providing North Yorkshire Police with the required level of strategic analysis across a number of areas of law enforcement. The exempt annex is in Annex D .
- 8.3 This is a 'refreshed' version of the 2013 JSIA. The North Yorkshire Community Safety Partnership,(NYCSP) meeting in December 2014, felt that this did not meet community safety requirements – to provide a strategic direction for the NYCSP and have agreed to add further detail to the document. The Ryedale additions (attached in Annex E) are therefore to be considered by an editorial task and finish group in February 2015.
- PCC Commissioned Safer Ryedale activity
- 8.4 In October 2015, the PCC commissioned the Local Delivery Teams (such as Safer Ryedale) and Safer York Community Safety Partnership, to deliver community safety interventions. Funding has been provided until March 31st 2016, paid on receipt of satisfactory performance data and with 10% withheld until the end of the contract as a performance incentive.
- 8.5 Ryedale received £22,287 of the £400,948 available. (The allocations based on population and crime statistics.) £20,001 of this is allocated to tackling ASB and £2,286 to a 'reactive pot' for Safer Ryedale to allocated to project required to address community safety issues arising throughout the year, raised by its 4 sub groups.
- 8.6 The first performance report is attached in Annex E. This indicates the wide range of ASB work being undertaken, with prevention and early intervention being key priorities.
- 8.7 Recent work has included a joint meeting with representatives of various agencies regarding establishing a pro active approach to community ASB concerns around the traveller transition camp at Wintringham.
- 8.8 Officers have requested details of other PCC commissioned activity in Ryedale, from the PCC, to ensure that we are working closely, adding value rather than duplication. This includes aspects such as victim support and street triage.

## **9.0 IMPLICATIONS**

- 9.1 The report is for information only.

## **10.0 NEXT STEPS**

- 10.1 Views of Members will be given to the Safer Ryedale partnership for inclusion in the 2015/16 action plan and to the NYCSP JSIA task and finish group.

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## JSIA UPDATES 2015 - RYEDALE

### COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT AND LOCAL PRIORITIES

A variety of approaches are used to engage with our community such as Community & Police (CAP) meetings which are held quarterly in four areas of the district and regular Neighbourhood Watch meetings are attended and supported by Safer Ryedale. Safer Ryedale undertakes an annual street survey including those residents that are harder to reach such as Next Steps, Ryedale Disability Action Group, Youth Groups, Y3A, Ryedale Special Families and the Older People's Forum.

### RISK AND VULNERABILITY

#### Domestic Abuse / Violence

Domestic abuse is one of the four priorities for Safer Ryedale. The Making Safe Scheme and awareness raising activity is delivered Ryedale wide. The focus is to increase the number of victims reporting domestic abuse.

### SAFER ROADS

Due to the rurality of Ryedale road safety is one of our four main priorities. Seasonal campaigns are carried out in conjunction with the 95 Alive Partnership such as Drive Alive being delivered in schools, Drive Wise to newly qualified drivers, young farmers and apprentices, motorcycle events, seatbelt, speeding and winter driving/drink drive events. The Scarborough, Whitby & Ryedale Speed Management Protocol is administered by Safer Ryedale.

### CAUSES AND ENABLERS

#### Alcohol & Drugs

Alcohol and Substance Misuse remains one of the main priorities for Safer Ryedale. All market towns have Pubwatch Schemes supported by Safer Ryedale with banning orders and warnings now common place. The Alcohol & Substance Misuse steering group deliver the key priorities identified in the North Yorkshire Alcohol Strategy and aim to work collaboratively to reduce alcohol related crime and ASB.

#### Mental Health & Familial Cycle

Ryedale targets young offenders and those of a risk of offending through support and education. Work with key partners is ongoing to deliver services to vulnerable people within Ryedale through a series of multi agency meetings such as Vulnerable MAPs, School MAPs, Developing Stronger Families and the new fortnightly Ryedale Multi Agency Team Tasking meetings.

### THE WIDER LANDSCAPE

#### Political

In addition to the General Election, Ryedale are holding a District Council Election on 7<sup>th</sup> May 2015.

#### Economic

On average, Ryedale has the lowest wages and highest housing affordability ratio in North Yorkshire

#### Social

The Tour de Yorkshire takes place on 1<sup>st</sup> – 3<sup>rd</sup> May and will travel through Ryedale on 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> May. Migrant workers reside and travel into Ryedale for jobs in various food processing plants and the farming industry.

### Technology

CSE is an issue in Ryedale. This is tackled through school MAP's and the Multi Agency Team Tasking meetings. Work is ongoing to raise awareness in all Ryedale schools.

### **RYEDALE**

Ryedale is sparsely populated but sees an increase in the visiting population in the summer months.

Safer Ryedale responds to community concerns around criminality and ASB relating to the seasonal influx of travellers to a transition camp in the district for 8 weeks of the year. This has a significant impact on service requirements for many organisations.

Safer Ryedale delivers effective support for a roadside family currently on ASBO. The family are monitored and regular visits are undertaken to ensure compliance to the ASBO conditions and health and wellbeing of the family.

The Ryedale Local Plan Strategy was adopted in September 2013. It sets an overall housing requirement of 200 homes per year in the district up to 2027 and attributes the following amount of residential development to key settlements: c.1500 homes in Malton and Norton, c.750 homes in Pickering, c.300 homes in Kirkbymoorside and c.150 homes in Helmsley, with c.300 homes distributed across ten service villages which are: Ampleforth; Amotherby/Swinton; Hovingham; Nawton/Beadlam; Sherburn; Sheriff Hutton; Staxton/Willerby and Thornton le Dale. The 300 homes will be distributed across the villages in as equitable a manner as possible, bearing in mind the site-specific nature of proposed sites and existing extant planning permissions. These developments will place an increased pressure on local infrastructure and local police resources.

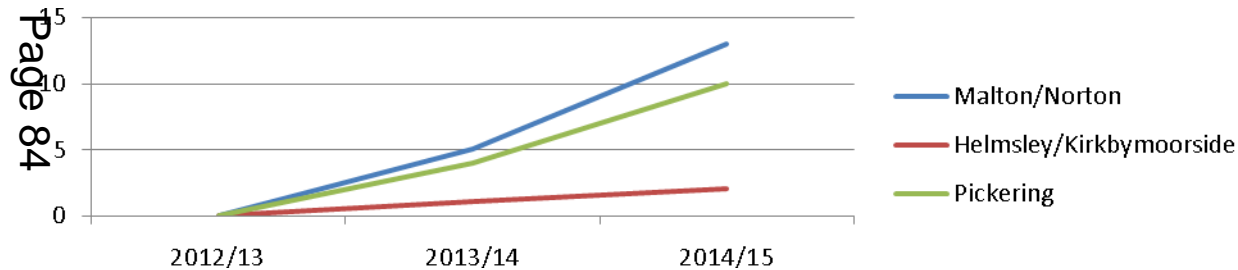

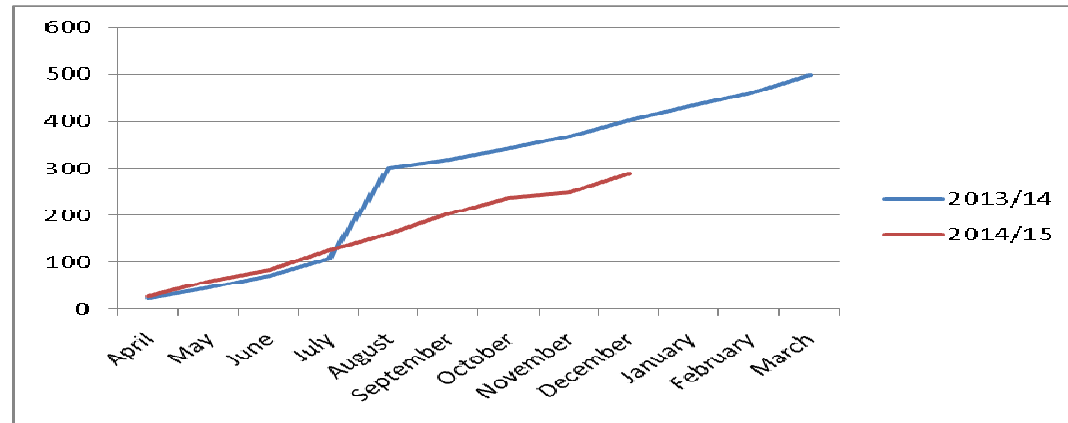

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### Emerging Issues

- Legal Highs

### Risks, Challenges & Barriers

- Legal highs are readily available for young people to walk into a high street shop and buy these drugs, many of them are as dangerous as class A substances and produced similar effects but not controlled under the Misuse of Drugs Act.
- Following recent awareness raising in all four secondary schools, Ryedale young people are classed as 'naive,' which is a concern in itself.
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### What needs to be done?

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- Safer Ryedale along with partners aim to respond quickly to legal highs and be flexible to any new and emerging threats of harm and ensure that intelligence is gathered by agencies working in partnership with NYP.
- Young people are educated on the effects and dangers of legal highs

- Legal High training will be delivered to teachers, Street Angels, door staff and members of our three Pubwatch schemes in Ryedale.
- Awareness raising and education on the effects of legal highs will continue in all of our Ryedale Schools
- The Ryedale Alcohol & Substance Misuse Steering Group will continue to deliver actions as per the Safer Ryedale Local Delivery Plan.
